My Train Story - Part 2

After we settled in our new home in Smithville, Missouri, I decided that I would try and rebuild my collection of Lionel trains and get back into the hobby. First I needed to finish my basement which took, due to heavy traveling, the better part of three years to do. My new job had me on the road for three and sometimes all four weeks in a month. My wife said that I was her college student since I was only home on weekends and that was just to wash my clothes, repack my suitcase and head back to the airport on Monday morning. I visited 24 of the 42 FRB offices to train their staff on how to use the new software that was being implemented across the FRB system. Some offices required many multiple visits.

One day, by accident, I discovered that there was a group of people who had formed the Kansas City Lionel Club and who maintained an operating layout at Union Station in Kansas City. I joined the group and started rebuilding my collection. I started out the rebuild process by attending several WGHOT (World's Greatest Hobby on Tour) train shows. It was there that I discovered the "I Love" state cars and started that collection. Little did I know that, at the time, it would take ten years to complete it.





Back to the basement. It was built to be a multi-functional space. It was an entertainment center with a dry bar. It was part media room with a large screen TV. I was a woodworking shop for my other hobby, carpentry. It was not built to be a permanent space for a train layout. It would be very large temporary space for a massive multi-track, multi-table, holiday train display. In the end, I had ten 4x8 foot tables that needed to be portable and removeable.









You will notice the many ceramic buildings scattered throughout the layout. This was also the time that I found out about Department 56 at a Christmas Shop in Branson, Missouri and at a local Hallmark Gold Crown Store. Now, far too pricy for my pocketbook. I found cheaper versions made by Lemax that were suitable for my temporary display.

I also wanted to note the mountain/tunnel in the right rear of the two pictures above. This was my first landscape project I ever attempted. Here are a few pictures of that process. Lots and lots of rigid foam insulation cut with a saber saw then glued and screwed together.









Then covered in many rolls of Woodland Scenic's plaster cloth, colorized with their earth tones, and landscape materials applied.









This was my solution to covering up the high portion of the dry bar. It was built in three sections for easy removal. Every November, it would go up and every January it would all come down and go into storage for next season. It all got given away to a fellow modeler when we moved.

The only other thing I would note about my time in Missouri was that I found and joined the Train Collectors Association (TCA), The Lionel Collectors Club of America (LCCA) after they merged with the original Lionel Railroad Club (LRRC), and the Lionel Operating Train Society (LOTS). I was a founding member of the Heart of America Chapter of TCA. You couldn't miss us at a train show with our bright banana yellow golf shirts.

Approaching age 65 in 2017, I began thinking about retirement. With the reduced income that would entail, we could not afford to do that and stay in Missouri. We began our search for a place that we could move to with space for our dogs. We found one through a long internet search, then we loaded up the trucks and moved to Tennessee. Pikeville, that is. I worked one year three months more in a remote status before putting in my retirement papers. What about my trains? That is Part 3 of "My Train Story".

6/15/21 - Steve Rosenstein, John Conor and I attended the ground-breaking of Buc-ee's.


There were quite a lot of people attending, including Mayor Mayberry, Mayor Foster, Senator Bailey and Representative Cameron Sexton.

Swap Meet - 6/12/21



Movie stars kissed with their mouths shut. At least, they did in the movies! There were no movie ratings because all movies were responsibly produced for everyone to enjoy viewing, without profanity or violence or most anything offensive.

If you grew up in a generation before there was fast food, you may want to share some of these memories with your children or grandchildren. Don't blame me if they bust their gut laughing.

Growing up isn't what it used to be, is it?

HO Scale News - Paul Falk

In June, the install to include the DCS240 command station in the tower was successful. The former DCS200 command station has been reconfigured to be a booster. Additionally, the HO tower wiring was upgraded to allow for easier reconfigurations going forward.

The layout is currently configured with the DCS200 powering the Southern RR loop (aka Red Line) with the DCS240 powering the other three. There is no way to connect the RR ammeter to both power sources. The meter is now only showing the Southern power usage.

The layout has been stress tested with 8 DCC locos (2 on each loop) without any overheating issues. Please report any DCC power issues you may experience. Only one so far has been reported and we were unable to reproduce the problem.

Make a right off the exit and go a half mile to Nashville Pike. Take a left onto Nashville Pike. The college will be on the left. Turn left at light on Gap Blvd then left onto Loop Road. 

Grogitsky's 0n30 Layout



The HO layout's booster upgrade is complete and the results are promising. Overheating has not recurred and the previous PM42 issues described in last month's DCC Shed have not reappeared. Only time will tell if the HO gremlins have left the building. Wish us luck! Please note and abnormalities you might experience and report those via emails as described below.

Big thank you to everyone who is remembering to release or dispatch locos from the systems as you finish with them. Doing so eliminates the annoying message to "steal a loco" and reduces the system maintenance to keep the slots available avoiding the "slots full" message.

A correction to the published LNWI name on the Club's HO layout. The correct name is

A quick update on the BLI address changer.. In the January DCC Shed the address changer was announced with some operating instructions. The unit has proved successful with HO, N and On30 locomotives. The changer has also allowed setting cab numbers on ESU brand decoders. Normally, ESU decoders require an ESU specialized programmer for changes. ESU decoders are used exclusively in Scale Trains

brand offerings.

If you experience any unexplained issues with the current DCC installations, HO or N, please document what you have encountered in an E-mail, or a note to Paul and Art.
