The DCC Shed @ CMRC Paul Falk

Come in and get comfortable.

This month, a quick review of DCC start up 7. Drive away and be happy. procedures in both HO and N scales.

First HO Scale

- 1. The DC/DCC selector switch for the loop you are using is set to DCC.
- Confirm the PS2012 DCC power supply is turned on. Green switch should be illuminated.
- Confirm the DCS200 and DCS240 controllers Scale switches are set to HO (fully down and the Mode switched are set to RUN (fully up).
- 4. Confirm the DCS200 and DCS Track Status Lights 4 are illuminated. (Red means the track power is on).

If not, there are several ways to turn on track power.

With a powered (battery inserted and/or plugged in to a fascia loconet outlet) Digitrax DT402 handheld, press the **Power** button and then the **Y** 6. button.

Or using an Android smart phone or tablet, connect to the HO scale wifi, press the red power button turning it green (track power on).

Lastly, the display on the JMRI computer has a red power button on the roster screen that can be used to turn on the track power.

5. Place your DCC capable Loco on the loop selected in #1 above.

- 6. Using the handheld you are using from #4 above, enter the DCC address of the loco you are running. (Note: the DCC address is just the cab number, not the roster number). JMRI roster numbers are 3 digits for the owner and hyphen and the cab number. So a loco owned by the Club is 999-2704 is simply addressed by the cab number 2704.

Next N Scale (the easy one)

- 1. The DSC/DCC selector switch for the loop you are using is set to DCC.
- 2. Confirm the DCS51 (Zephyr Extra) controller is on (illuminated display).
- 3. Confirm the DCS51 Track Status Light is illuminated. If not, press the power button, the light should now be red (Red means the track power is on.)
- Place your DCC capable Loco on the loop selected in #1 above.
- 5. Using controls on the Zephyr, press the 'Loco' Button, then type the loco's address, engine number, press 'loco' again, then use the Zephyr Throttle and direction lever to begin running your loco.
 - Using Android smart phone or tablet, connect the N scale wifi, enter the DCC address of the loco you are running. (Note: the DCC address is just the cab number, not the roster number. JMRI roster numbers are 3 digits for the owner and hyphen and the cab number. So a loco owned by the Club is 999-2704 is simpley addressed by the cab 2704).
- 7. Drive away and be happy.

For both scales, our convention is to return the loco selector DC/DCC switch to **DC** (the default mode) when you are finished running DCC.

One note of trouble shooting for smart phones and tablets. If you fail to find the wifi for the scale, that usually means the computer is off and needs to be turned on. Open the scale's computer and press the power button. No other computer commands are required. The computer will auto-start all functions and should be available in 2-3 minutes. Just close the computer and be patient

Remember, one-on-one DCC training is always available, so let us know. We are here to help. If you experience any unexplained issues with the current DCC installations, HO or N, please document what you have encountered in an E-mail, or a note to Paul and Art.
