The Prez. Sez:


Welcome to February; Spring is coming closer. I am sure everybody is looking forward to it. I know I am.

As a Club, I think we are doing pretty well.



The DCC Shed @ CMRC

Welcome All. Settle in and get comfortable.

Over the past few months, we've fielded questions from members looking for the best DCC system recommendations. This often asked question has an easy answer: *it depends!* If you ask six people what the best brand is, you'll probably get at least 12 different answers. (we can be fickle)

Best for you might be different than what is best for someone else. In the end, we cannot answer this question for you. However, we can give you a list of things you should consider. With enough information you can make an informed decision to get the right Digital Command Control system for you.

Start with the system specs. But remember, specifications only tell part of the story. Thanks to the world wide web, there is a wealth of information at your fingertips. Make good use of the resource. Most DCC manufacturers have websites and forums...a good source of other owners opinions. Both good and bad.

<u>Try It First!</u> For any system you are considering. Try and find one to test drive. After all you will spend lots of time with whatever you select.

While testing, here are some points to consider: (your list will likely be longer)

What is available for your chosen scale?

Was the throttle layout easy to use?

Do I want walk-around throttles?

How long did it taks you to learn to operate your

train? Can you control multiple trains at once?

How easy is it to program decoders?

Do you want to automate turnouts? If so, were you able to throw turnouts?

Are the system components easy to wire? Can they be wireless?


Is future expansion needed? Does the system expand easily?

Are there other owners close by for advice?

Finally, how much of your railroad budget can be used for DCC? Costs vary dramatically as you answer and prioritize the points above. Last month The Shed had a sub \$100., DIY command station. Remember to include the costs of DCC locomotives and other accessories.

Enjoy your research!
