That representatives with Puy du Fou, a historical theme park company based in France, are planning to meet with the Tribal Council of th Eastern Band of the Cherokee Indians in the near future to discuss the possibility of establishing a project at the 407 exit of Interstate 40.

Puy du Fou has been nominated twice for Los Angeles' "Best Theme Park in the World" Thea Classic Award and once for Orlando's Applause Award. The theme park features shows where visitors are immersed in programs of history.

Interstate Exit 407 is planning to include the first ever Buc-ee's Family Travel Center featuring 120 fueling stations, Electric Vehicle charging stations and a 250-foot-long car wash.

Welcome All. Settle in and get comfortable.

Responding to some complaints from operators that their new cell phones and tablets are refusing to use either of the available WiFi sources for the HO & N layouts. This is a function of the operating system of the phone or tablet.

Typically the WiFi is used as the source of an internet connection for gaining access to the larger world wide internet.

The layout WiFi sources are isolated to only the layout. When the phone or tablet connects to the WiFi and checks and checks for internet connectivity, it finds it is not usable for internet use, it will provide an error message. Look carefully at the error message. There should be an option to either **ignore the error** or **connect anyway.**

If you did not respond to this option correctly the first time, you will need to turn off your WiFi, then turn it back on to select it again. Future sessions should work without issue. Please note this may happen after your device has had an operating system update. If so, just pick the option to allow again.

Remember, the Club's Digitrax various walk around throttles are available if you can't use your device to connect via WiFi.

BNSF

A federal judge in Omaha, Nebraska, has extended an order preventing the two largest unions at BNSF from going on strike over a new attendance policy the railroad imposed this month.

The judge ruled that a strike by the unions that represent 17,000 BNSF workers would violate federal law because the issue is a minor dispute under their contracts.


The unions argued that the new rules that took effect Feb. 1 discourage workers from taking sick time during the pandemic and penalize employees for missing work for any reason. But the judge's ruling Tuesday means they will have to address their concerns through arbitration or negotiation.

Judge Mark Pittman said a strike would arguably hurt "every single American" because of the damage it could do to the economy and all the businesses that rely on BNSF to deliver their products.

The presidents of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineer and Trainman, and the Transportation Division of the International Association of Sheet Metal, Air, Rail, and Transportation unions said in a joint statement that they were "infuriated" by the ruling and will consider appealing it.

The railroad said the ruling will help it serve its customers and deliver the nation's goods.

BNSF is one of the largest railroads in the United States, and it operates 32,500 miles (52,300 kilometers) of track in 28 western states.

The First Headlight

The earliest light bulb was invented around the same time as the first steam locomotive. But that "light bulb" was really just a wire glowing very faintly while scientists hooked it up to several zillion volts. If you wanted a light bulb that actually worked well, you had to wait many decades more. So, for much of the 19th century, you had trains without electric lights.

That raised the obvious question: What do we do with trains at night? Which prompted an obvi-

ous answer: Nothing. Leave them stationary. We don't run factories at night, so there is no need to run trains at night either. The night is a good time for sleeping, not driving trains.

As the years ticked by, however, the demand for transport grew, and it gradually made more and more sense to schedule night trains. The problem was that if a bunch of deer were chilling on the tracks, or some villain had tied up a maiden and left her there, the driver wouldn't be able to see, and catastrophe would ensue. They needed some way to illuminate the path ahead of them, and in 1932, a railroad pioneer Horatio Allen had the answer.

He hitched two cars in *front* or the locomotive that normally led the train. These were flatcars—no seats and no walls. On the first car, he laid down a bed of sand then piled a bunch of wood on top and set it on fire. On the second car, behind it, he set up sheets of iron so they'd reflect the fire's light forward. As the train moved ahead, the huge fire would light the way and warn track loiters to flee.

The first train headlight suited Allen's purpose fine (to create a giant train fire, because he thought this would be fun). But other people looked at it and said, "Uh, Allen, we know it's the 19th century and all, but we've already figured out how to direct light without uncontrolled open flames." And so, when night trains became more common in the years right after this, people built headlights using a much more practical method. They hung lanterns.

Our last few operating sessions have been disappointing. No, not problems running trains; the problem is having more trains to run than engineers and conductors to run them!

We tried having the session the same Monday as our regular monthly meeting, starting at noon or at 10 AM. That does make for a long day but cuts down on separate trips to Crossville for those living further away.

For March, we are going to have the session on the FIRST Monday, and trying an afternoon session, starting immediately following the HO meeting. We will have our normal slate of trains to run, passenger and through freights, local freights (turns) to various industries on the layout, yardmaster and dispatching.

If you have never tried operations, don't be afraid to come and try your hand. We can pair you with one of our experienced operators until you are familiar with the line. It is a LOT different from when we are open to the public with four separate loops running. We convert the layout into a point-to-point line, running from one staging yard in the back room, all around the layout and to the second staging yard in the back room. We aren't using car cards or switch lists, and do provide "Train Sheets" with detailed instructions for each train.

We do run DCC for the session. If you are not familiar with how the throttles work, or how to use an app on your phone, we have people that will guide you!

Try it—You'll like it!
