
### HO Scale News - Paul Falk

Recently we had a situation there no locomotive would operate on the Norfolk & Western line. This held true for both DC and DCC. Following further testing, it was discovered that we had a bad PM42 (the device that acts as a circuit breaker). After replacing the PM42, everything returned to normal.

There have been some concerns regarding the batteries used in the hand held throttles not having a full charge when used.

We have changed the charging system so the charger is on all the time.

If you have a concern about not having a fully functional battery to use when you want to use the DCC and you will be using either a UT4 or a DT402, it is suggested that you can bring a 9 volt battery from home. It should last for quite a while as the current draw is minimal.

### N Scale News - Jan Novack

We are making progress on the Tortoise installation. Five of the planned six tortoises are mounted. One, at the stub siding by the town, is wired and complete.

A reminder: If an engine is changed from the ones I put out for the week, leave a note with the reason for the change. I recently found one engine sitting on a repair form that was not filled out. A second engine was on a note that said the engine was lying on the table, don't know why. The third engine was running on the mountain line, different from the one I put out. No explanation for the change.

I tested all engines, and they worked fine. I need to know why changes were made or backup engines were put out so I know if there was a problem that needs fixing.

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Come on in and welcome to the first (of 3) articles designed to be of assistance to many of our newer members over the past year or so, many of whom have expressed an interest in the 'DCC World', but have little or new experience, in some of the need-to-know 'basics'. We will attempt to begin with a general understanding of terms, their meanings/ capabilities, and progress to a wider understanding of use, etc. in future articles in upcoming months.

First of all, what does DCC mean: It is an acronym for 'digital command control', meaning the use of digital messages sent through the rails to a specifically controlled DCC locomotive and its embedded decoder (usually identified by its Cab Number (Address)) to perform certain functions: direction/ speed/lighting/sounds (\*if do equipped), and others. By sending these messages to a specific locomotive, this feature allows multiple locomotives to be controlled on the same rails at the same time without interfering with each other, in contrast to 'DC' operation, where all locomotives on the same track are operated in the same direction and speed based on the voltage which is applied to the rails from the DC Power Pack by adjusting the rheostat (speed control) on the face of the Power Pack. While the methods employed are much more complex than described here, this is the basis for DCC vs. DC operation.

Other terms important to the purchase of a locomotive in the DCC world are: DCC On-Board, DCC Ready, DCC Capable and DCC/SND. These terms are normally printed on the locomotive box and enclosed

paperwork. While the differences may appear to be simple to the purchaser when he/she buys a new locomotive, what does the purchaser do when buying a previously owned loco without a box or manual to describe the capabilities, hence the importance of understanding these terms, not only for pricing levels, but for operations as well. We will delve into methods for attempting to identify locos, decoders, and manufacturers in future articles.

General descriptions are as follows:

'DCC On-Board', or often just 'DCC'. This means that the loco has been assembled with a DCC Decoder installed, and is ready to be used with a DCC Command Station from any certified DCC Manufacturer compliant with NMRA Standards,

'DCC Ready'. This term is used to identify a loco which does NOT have a decoder installed, but has been equipped with a decoder socket (8, 9, or 21 pin) for the user to insert an available decoder purchased separately.

'DCC Capable'. Used to describe a locomotive which can be converted to DCC, but without a factory installed socket, requiring the installation of a decoder to be hardwired/soldered prior to use.

'DCC/SND'. Fully ready for use with the additional features of Sound in addition to those found in the typical 'non-sound' decoder.

**NOTE 1:** It should be noted here, that a new DCC locomotive is shipped from all manufacturers with an address of '03'. The same applies to a newly purchased decoder for self installation.

There are other factors from Manufacturers which also indicate the DCC Status of the loco. For example 'Atlas' has several series of locos in both HO

Initial offerings in Peco's TT scale line will include flextrack, medium-radius turnouts, a signal box kit, Great Western Railway prototype country station and goods shed kits, platform kits, and buffer shops. Future releases are scheduled to include additional lineside components, accessories, and rolling stock.

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cont. from page 3 & N scales: 'Gold Series' (DCC/SND), 'Silver Series' (DCC Ready), while others manufacture only one type of locomotive Broadway Limited (BLI) (DCC/SND), and others which manufacture a host of various combinations (Walthers, Scale Trains, Athearn, KATO (now offering a host of options in DCC and decoder combinations in the past 2-3 years, previously only offering DCC in their custom KOBO offerings.))

**NOTE 2**: It is also noted here that while the common decoders of 5-15 years ago were primarily 8 or 9 pin decoders, the expansion into the 21 pin decoder world of ESU Loksound is expanding rapidly. We recently noticed a large uptick of the recently offered Atlas, Kato and Walthers' locos, as well as in the Scale Trains line. The reason this is important here is that this brand of decoder requires special tools for complete programming capability. In our next article we will explore several areas of programming capabilities, as well as unique methods available to assist the new DCC user in getting up to speed.



Special trains were running with the Fourth of July theme. The 'O' scale layout featured 2 trains of 25 cars each. Locomotives were models of the 1776 patriotic themed diesel and there were boxcars for each of the 50 states. The cars were lined up in order of the States joining the Union from Delaware to Hawaii. Since the visitors were from all parts of the USA (VT, FL, TX, MO, IL, MI, CA, KS, KY, NJ and WA), there were some searching to find their car.

Another track on the layout featured cars saluting each of the Armed Forces.

The 'HO' scale layout had a variety of steam and diesel models running including the full consist of the Southern Pacific Coast Daylight train pulled by the iconic GS4 #4449, which pulled the Bi-Centennial Freedom Train in 1976.

After enjoying lunch served at Cheesecakes and More, the travelers were back on the bus headed for Fiddler's Grove Historic Village in Lebanon, then back to Nashville.
