



The DCC Shed @ CMRC Paul Falk Art Landrigan

Welcome to the Shed. Step in, have a seat and chat about DCC with special attention to our new members. Back to basics.

An advantage of DCC equipped locomotives on the same section of track is that, each can be independently controlled via a digital system. They can also be run together just like prototypical railroads. Within Digital Command Control jargon grouping locomotives so they all respond together to throttle commands is called consisting. There are three popular published methods of consisting locomotives, and they have their advantages and disadvantages.

On the prototype, railroads use multiple unit hookups called MU to run several locomotives from one cab. Digital Command Control lets us do the same on our model railroads, using a process called consisting.

The first and easiest is called simple/basic consisting or address consisting. Simply program each loco to the same address. Say for example 4. It's easy to do, and you can take all your number 4 locomotives from one layout to another and they will run together regardless of the DCC system being used, and

they'll continue to respond to the same lighting and sound commands. Only the lead or front locomotive should do that. Also without some other programming they will all have to face the same direction.

The second is called command-stationassisted or universal consisting. This method tells the DCC base station which locomotives are to be treated as part of the consist. Each DCC system has different methods for setting up universal consists. Consult that system's manual. With universal consisting, you can individually set each locomotive's direction and how it responds to commands (turning off the headlight, horn, and bell for trailing units, for instance). The biggest drawback here is that it's tied to the DCC system, not the locomotives, so it's not portable. If you take your locomotives to another layout, you will have to reprogram your consist on that system.

The third is more talented and is called advanced consisting. It is more complicated than the other methods, but it gives you more capabilities. Some older decoders may not support advanced consisting. This method changes CV settings in the loco's decoder. With advanced consisting, the same consist address (a number from 1 to 127) is set into CV19 of all locomotives in the consist. All locomotives will then respond simultaneously

This show usually draws vendors covering over 200 tables and approx. 800 visitors.


Anyone wishing to sell, please let me know by the end of October and I will get a bock of tables so we can be together.

HO Scale News Richard Morris

Everyone has been pretty good about writing up problems on locomotives. Remember, the more details, the better. What the engine is doing, or not doing and where it happened.

But sometimes, all the information provided is "Engine stopped running". tested later, the problem cannot be reproduced. Had the engine been running for a while and gotten hot? Did it hit a dead spot in the track? Something else happen?

Remember you cannot provide "too much information". We always try to fix the loco so you don't have to send it back.

to commands sent to the consist address. By programming different values into CVs 21 and niques, always refer to the appropriate docu-22, you can control which direction each locomotive moves, as well as which function keys in use. they respond to. A drawback is the complexity of programming CV21 and CV22. Luckily there are tools that help you with this, like Digitrax's online calculator and the Consist Tool in JMRI DecoderPro software. **Taking** these locos to another layout will require undoing the setups. It is most often easier to reset the decoder and then reprogram the cab number.

Now for a 4th very easy method using ments, or ideas.

the free Engine Driver software on an android phone or tablet. Here the consist only resides in the Engine Driver software. You add locos by their individual cab number to the consist controlling the direction of each. change speeds, it will simply send individual commands to each loco. When you release the locos or turn off Engine Driver, the consist is gone. This does require the layout have a wifi connection.

Whatever method you use to consist your locomotives, it is important to make sure that they all respond to speed steps in the same way. You don't want one locomotive holding back the consist while another grinds its wheels. But that's a process a bit too complicated to explain in this space.

This is just a brief overview of techmentation for whatever system and decoder




Murfreesboro, Sevierville, Knoxville, Ridge and north Georgia. The public is, of course, invited and admission is, as always, free free free.

A reminder to Club members running N scale, please keep the speed slow and steady. We think that some of the recent problems came from running the trains too fast.


