Special Guest at CMRC Meeting in February

All members are encouraged to attend the upcoming monthly meeting of CMRC on February 13. A special presentation by author/historian Ralcon Wagner will get into the research behind his just released this month book entitled *Tennessee Central, the First 50 Years.*


For over 60 years, the Tennessee Central Railway spanned 296 miles, linking western Kentucky with middle and east Tennessee. Visionary businessman, Jere Baxter, consolidated several railroads over the course of five years. By 1904, his new railway was serving numerous coal mines on its eastern end. The colorful, regional road was loved and revered by citizens in the cities it served. The scrappy, homespun railroad would spend most of its existence fighting for survival as it faced aggressive competition from other railroads and fended off bankruptcy on several occasions. As an author and historian, Wagner has been an avid railroad enthusiast all his life. He started researching the history of the Tennessee Central more than 50 years ago. For this volume, he has selected rare archival images from several historical groups and from

his own collection, most having never been published. Wagner has written articles for national historical magazines and is the author of *Nashville's Streetcars and Interurban Railways* and *South Nashville*. He is a member of the TCA Music City Chapter Board of Directors. He lives in Nashville.

The DCC Shed @ CMRC Paul Falk

Welcome to the Shed. This month we start a little journey into a less expensive method for operating slow motion switch machines. In 2022 Digitrax discontinued its DS64 quad stationary decoder replacing it with a DS74 quad stationary decoder. Similar in function to the DS64 packaged with new features, it is not a simple plug-in replacement. Because of this, it does not integrate easily on an existing layout. Oh and by the way, it is considerably more expensive.

On the heals of the DS74 comes a new DS78V Eight Servo LocoNet Stationary Accessory decoder for turnout control. This unit is designed to use a new Digitrax DSXSV9 9G very common Circuitron Tortoise.

tion Control Servo is roughly one third less er routing or to power a trackside signal or cost than the Tortoise. The DSXSV9 does not panel lights. have the two internal switches so it can be cheaper. A DS78V Eight Servo decoder and eight DSXSV9 servos would be a little less than \$200. Not a bargain but less than eight Tortoises and two DS74's at nearly \$400.

But wait, there is more! Digitrax has

also introduced the DS44 Basic Quad Stationary Decoder. Less than \$40. No fancy case. No option for push button operation. It can only be controlled via Loconet commands that it receives via the rail power it is powered from. (No power supply needed) So this is only an option for DCC only layouts.

Now some turtle background. Since their introduction in 1984, the Circuitron Tortoise switch machine has been a stalwart performer in many layouts. Since 2019 they have seen a few major improvements. A new motor supplier and new printed circuit type with a new industry standard connector spacing that is built from a fire-retarding printed circuit material called FR-4. There have been few competitors, most notably of late is the Cobalt iP Digital from DCC Concepts originally in Australia. The Cobalt is a very similar design to the Tortoise. Hummingbird Cake

2 c. flour 2 c. sugar

1 tsp. salt 1 tsp. soda

1 tsp. cinnamon 3 eggs, beaten

1-1/2 c. oil 1-1/2 tsp. vanilla

1 can (8 oz.) crushed 2 c. nuts

pineapple, drained 2 c. chopped bananas

Combine dry ingredients. Add eggs and oil. Do not beat. Stir in vanilla, pineapple, bananas and 1 c. nuts. Bake 350 degrees for 25-30 minutes (3 layers, 9" pan.) Spread frosting and sprinkle with remaining cup of nuts.

N Scale News

This is the track plan for the revision to the N scale layout that we are making to the area by the wall. The main line will split into four tracks that will pass by a passenger station area. Two lines will be main track options, and two lines will be passing sidings. Tortoise switch machines will control the power to each line so that multiple passenger trains can be staged and switched during our days we are open if desired.


The freight line main track will swoop below the passenger area before returning close to its present track. Entries into the

smaller freight yard will come from two new turnout positions.

The turntable and roundhouse will be reinstalled and a diesel engine house will be added.

All turnouts will be tortoise controlled and will control the power to the various sidings.

This change allowed us to increase the radius of the curve on the main line in the corner to 18 inches (from 15). The freight line will see a comparable increase (from 14 inch radius).



N Scale (Project update)

The first part of the main line track revision (runs along the perimeter of the layout) has been completed. The Tortoises to control not wired yet. A temporary buss line bypass is in place so we can operate the main line for our visitors.


